

ONION CREEK SCHOOL DISTRICT LEVY ELECTION FEBRUARY 13, 2024

At its November 20, 2023 meeting, the Onion Creek School District Board of Directors voted to submit a Replacement Educational Programs and Operation Levy to the voters on February 13, 2024. This levy replaces a levy that expires at the end of calendar year 2024 and will be used to pay for expenses of educational programs and operations that are not fully funded by the State of Washington. These expenses include, but are not limited to, the breakfast and lunch program, preschool, materials and supplies, insurance, building maintenance and operation, and unfunded personnel costs.

The proposed four-year replacement levy would authorize the collection of taxes to provide up to \$98,500 each year from 2025 through and including 2028. The tax levy rate required to produce these levy amounts is estimated to be \$2.14 per \$1000 of assessed value, the same rate currently charged. Exemptions from taxes are available to certain homeowners. To determine if you qualify, call the Stevens County Assessor at (509) 684-6161.

OCS TRANSPORTATION DEPARTMENT

For this issue, we learned about Onion Creek School's Transportation Department. We first interviewed Christine Zuber, Director and Driver. She shared some interesting facts about our three buses—this past year they traveled 23,000 miles and cost \$14,000 to keep their diesel tanks filled. They carry 35-40 kids to and from our school, as well as transporting students from Onion Creek into Colville for high school. The skill and dedication of our drivers should be obvious to anyone who drives our challenging roads.
